Krishna Kringles Beard Santa on His Own Turf

NEW YORK—A coast-to-coast Santa Claus rumble is brewing over control of prime jingle-bell turf.

From New York's Fifth Ave. to busy shopping streets in Los Angeles, Denver, San Francisco, Cincinnati and Nashville, the confrontation pits traditional Christmastime Santas sponsored by the Volunteers of America against new Santas who are members of the Hare Krishna religious sect. There have been no fist-fights or pulling of beards yet, but emotions are running high.

The Volunteers of America contend that the Hare Krishna Santas are discouraging shoppers along Fifth Ave. near Rockefeller Center from contributing to their Santas, and the charges against the Krishna Kringles are echoed elsewhere.

"These Hare Krishna Santas ask people for donations; they grab them by the arm and follow them down the block," Lt. Col. Don Schwartz, director of operations for the Volunteers of America in the New York metropolitan area, said Friday.

"They are discouraging people from coming up to the sidewalk Santas' chimneys. In many cases they block our chimneys and ask donors not to give to the Volunteers of America. This has affected our contributions considerably."

In Los Angeles, the Krishna Klauses are in hot competition with Santa's Belles. "They mill around with Santa's Belles, the girls who ring the bells, and try to get donations,"

David Heim, a spokesman for the city's social service department, said.
"It confuses the public because they don't know who they are."

San Francisco policemen report that Krishna Klauses "give people a flower and follow them down a street until they get a donation or their flower back."

In Cincinnati, patrolman Thomas Kellison arrested four Krishna followers for soliciting funds without a license, then had to face the teasing of fellow officers who chided him for "arresting Santa." One suggested that Kellison should get back to his beat because "there's a sleigh double-. parked."

Complaints of aggressive tactics and of Santas with split personalities have been registered in Denver and Nashville:

In New York, Schwartz said that the sight of double Santas was leav-: ing the public "entirely confused."

Volunteers of America Santas are trained to be pleasant and courteous at all times and to "think jolly." They are instructed to wish people Merry

Christmas with sincerity.

Romapada Das, a New York spokesman for Hare Krishna religious sect, Friday denied any rudeness or competition. "Before we began this whole program this year, we instructed our devotees not to interfere at all with the activities of the Volunteers of America. We request that. they (shoppers) give a donation. It is a voluntary thing," he said.

On Friday a chill wind swept down Fifth Ave., hurrying the steps of shoppers on the crowded street. Directly in front of the statue of Atlas holding up the world at Rockefeller Center, a pair of fleet-footed Krishna Kringles, who had exchanged their robes for Santa suits, stopped shop-

"Ho, ho, ho, have you been a good boy this year?" William Halvorson asked an apparently uninterested bystander. Halvorson sought to present the shopper with a small candy cane. but was rebuffed.

In contrast to John Kovac, a Volunteers of America Santa who

stood by his red brick chimney, Halvorson carried a small pail with some change and a few dollar bills in it and wore vivid red rouge on his cheeks.

Kovac complained that Hare Krishna Klauses were running back and forth near his chimney. "If they want to do their thing, they should do it over there," he said in annoyance, pointing up the street.

A shopper walked by and stopped in front of Kovac's chimney for a

moment.

"Merry Christmas," the Santa said, a tone of warm sincerity suddenly appearing in his voice.
